CITIZENSHIP

We expect pupils to show the kind of behaviour required by a responsible parent and we aim for them to develop as caring, considerate members of the school community and the wider world. We expect pupils to behave in a polite and caring manner towards others and we encourage them to develop a sense of responsibility towards themselves and others.

Our Golden Rules are followed throughout the school and we expect pupils to:

- Respect one another in all aspects of life
- Show consideration for the needs of others
- Take a pride in their appearance and that of the school building and grounds.

We believe in praising and rewarding positive behaviour. Our aim is to give a child praise and attention by 'catching them being good'.

We reward children in many ways. Pupil of the Week and Lunchtime Award certificates are given out every week at a Friday Celebration Assembly.

Children in the Foundation Phase are rewarded with praise and stickers, and, in addition to this, once children enter Key Stage 2 there is a house point system with points given for work, effort and behaviour.



Pupils annually elect House Captains and Vice-Captains for each of the four houses: Usk, Ebbw, Wye, Severn.

We have robust behaviour for learning approach and any incidences of misbehaviour or bullying are dealt with promptly and fairly. Our aim is to teach children how to make the right decisions in all circumstances and to equip them for later life.

A strong partnership between home and school is a major contributor to your child's progress and development. The support that you provide for your child is crucial in their future success and we believe in working closely with you in at all stages of your child's education. It is always helpful to us if you let us know of any concerns or any changes at home which might impact on your child in school.

Please ensure that all items of clothing are clearly marked with your child's name.





If your child is unable to attend as a result of illness, please either telephone the school or send a note in on your child's return. (Or **TEXT 07451 644956.**)

We will be unable to provide authorisation for legal absence if we receive no notification.

We follow Welsh Government regulations for marking the register.

- If your child visits the doctor or the dentist then this will be recorded as an **authorised absence**.
- Children arriving after 8.50am will be marked as **late**.
- The register closes at 9.20am. (Half an hour after the official start time)
- Children arriving after this time have an **unauthorised absence**.

The school will only authorise holidays if a child has attendance of 95% or higher.



JEWELLERY

Children are allowed to wear one ring, but decorative bracelets and necklaces are not permitted.

Children may wear a wrist watch but, together with rings, they must be removed for P.E. activities.

For health and safety reasons only neat ear studs are to be worn.

If your child is young and not yet able to remove their earrings for P.E., please send tape or plasters so that they may be safely covered. Children are not permitted to wear any other piercings such as nose studs.

The Sikh kara may be worn but it should be taped up during gymnastics.

Governors are unable to accept responsibility for damage or theft of personal items brought to school.

PASTORAL CARE



It is important that we maintain an up to date record of telephone numbers and addresses for contact purposes, and so we ask you to notify the office immediately if there are any changes.

Minor cuts and bruises will be dealt with at school, but if further medical treatment is needed then a child's parent or guardian will be contacted.

The school will administer prescription medication if necessary (once appropriate forms have been completed) but medicines requiring three doses daily are expected to be administered at home, before school and then at home time. If a lunchtime medicine dose is necessary, then parents are invited to administer the dose in school.

If your child has a medical condition requiring *essential regular medication* it will be necessary for you to complete the forms held with the Secretary before nominated staff are permitted to dispense it.

Children are not permitted to have any form of occasional self-medication in school eg. throat sweets or lip-salve unless there is written permission from the parent.



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THE NATIONAL CURRICULUM

The school is responding to the new Successful Futures Curriculum in Wales proposed by Professor Donaldson and we will provide opportunities for children to develop as:

- Ambitious, capable learners
- Enterprising, creative contributors
- Healthy, confident individuals
- Ethical, informed citizens

The curriculum has been arranged into six Areas of Learning Experience (AoLEs) and these are:

- Expressive Arts
- Health and Well-being
- Humanities
- Languages, Literacy and Communication (Including Welsh)
- Mathematics and Numeracy
- Science and Technology

In addition, there are three frameworks that we embed across the curriculum and these are:

- Literacy
- Numeracy
- Digital Competency



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WELSH

Creating a Welsh ethos in the school is important so that pupils are aware of the language, culture, history and geography of Wales.

Children begin to learn incidental Welsh when they are in the Nursery and a programme of teaching Welsh occurs throughout the school.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious Education follows the Agreed Syllabus for R.E. (Newport) and we seek to develop and enhance the children's understanding of other faiths.

Pupils may be exempt from Religious Education upon written request from their parents.

SCHOOL WORSHIP

An act of collective worship is held daily.

Assemblies provide opportunities for promoting thoughtful attitudes regarding relationships with one another, our community and the world.

These assemblies may be teacher led, pupil led or we may have a visitor to

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take them. They are non-denominational and provide moral guidance and an opportunity for quiet reflection. They include stories from world religions and from literary traditions.

We take the opportunity to visit other places of worship as part of our Religious Education curriculum.

Pupils may be exempt from assemblies upon written permission from parents.

PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION

At the end of their time in St Woolos, we expect children to have gained a simple understanding of the human body, of conditions for healthy living and of the interdependence of humans and the natural world.

We also encourage the development of skills enabling pupils to choose a healthy diet, practise dental hygiene and road safety, communicate their ideas about health education and use their knowledge to keep themselves clean and tidy.

We are supported in this by talks and visits provided by medical and emergency services. Pupils in the Nursery and in Reception classes take part in a tooth brushing scheme.

Pupils are encouraged to develop an awareness of their own and other people's feelings and to share and co-operate.

The Governing Body believe that Sex Education is a parental responsibility. However, the Science curriculum in Year Six leads up to this. A copy of the school's Sex Education Policy is available on request.

We make special note of the moral and religious views of all parents in all aspects of school life.

A Healthy Week is held every year and the school holds Healthy Schools' awards. In addition, it holds the Eco Schools' Gold Award and its working towards accreditation for the Platinum Award.



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CHARGING AND PERMISSION

The Governing Body recognises the valuable contribution that a wide range of additional activities and experiences can make towards pupils' personal and social education.

A voluntary contribution may be requested for visits to theatres, museums and other places of educational interest. Charges will be calculated to cover admission prices and transport costs and will be subsidized whenever possible by fund-raising within the school.

No child is excluded from an activity which is part of their curriculum because of their inability to pay.

The school has a separate Charging and Remissions Policy which is available for you to see.

Visits to school by theatre groups, musicians and professional writers are generally funded by the Friends of St Woolos or the School Fund as part of the curriculum, but Governors retain the right to seek voluntary contributions for participation in such visits.

Residential visits can be charged for but, wherever possible, the school subsidizes the cost of visits. Financial regulations prevent any school from making a profit on curriculum trips and activities.



VISITS

All children take part from time to time in visits to places of interest outside the school. The cost is kept to a minimum and no child is excluded solely because of their inability to pay.

These visits take place because of their relevance to a topic being studied by the pupils.



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PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

The school has an active parents' and grandparents' association called the Friends of St Woolos and their aim is to further co-operation between home and school. It is hoped that as many parents and grandparents as possible will become involved with The Friends of St Woolos who arrange a programme of activities, such as Summer Fayres, throughout the year and who have given practical and financial help to the school.

All parents are automatically members of The Friends of St Woolos.

Parent volunteers are welcomed into the school to help with many activities, including reading and cookery. Parents are also involved in helping with adult ratios on educational visits and inter-school matches.

We welcome any talks from parents about interesting hobbies or about their occupations.

During the past year, we have had parents and grandparents coming into school to help with such things as hearing readers, supporting in the class or making resources.

The school regularly participates in Family Learning projects and parents are invited to attend these sessions which are of great benefit to both children and parents.

Your help is very important and plays a key role important in the educational development of your child and in the life of our school.

DINNER MONEY AND LUNCHTIME
ARRANGEMENTS



The School Meal Service is run by Chartwell's Catering.

Payment for school dinners must be made via Parent Pay, which is an online payment system. Further details are available from the school office.

School meals cost £2.10.

Halal meals are available if desired and individual dietary requirements are catered for after consultation with dieticians from Gwent Health.

Children may bring sandwiches to school at lunchtime if you wish. However, since we are a member of the Healthy Schools' network, we would ask you that you ensure that your child is sent with a healthy lunchbox containing fruit and an appropriate balance of food.

We are a member of the Eco Schools' network and children are expected to take all food packaging, or uneaten food, home.

Please do not send your child in with cans of fizzy drink or glass bottles.

Children are not allowed to bring bars of chocolate or sweets to school although they may have a chocolate snack, biscuit or crisps in their lunchbox if you choose.

We operate a Fruit Tuck Shop at breaktime and children may bring in fruit or buy a piece in school for a cost of 20p daily. No crisps are permitted on the yard.

The school philosophy is to encourage children to make healthy food choices and to develop lifelong habits of healthy food eating.

Whilst we are unable to guarantee that our school environment is nut-free we would ask you not to send in any food products with your child which contain nuts.
